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POSSIBLE STUDY DESTINATIONS

The College of Arts, Social Sciences and Celtic Studies and its disciplines are linked – through the Erasmus Programme - with partner universities in **Europe** that offer courses through English.

There are also some exchange links with universities in the **USA, Canada and Hong Kong**.

(Not all subjects may be available through English in every university.)

Some terms we use

Home University: University of Galway

Host University: the university where you study abroad

Exchange agreement: a “contract” between universities to exchange students, usually in a particular subject area

Learning agreement: a “contract” between you and your home/host universities, setting out what courses you will take while abroad.

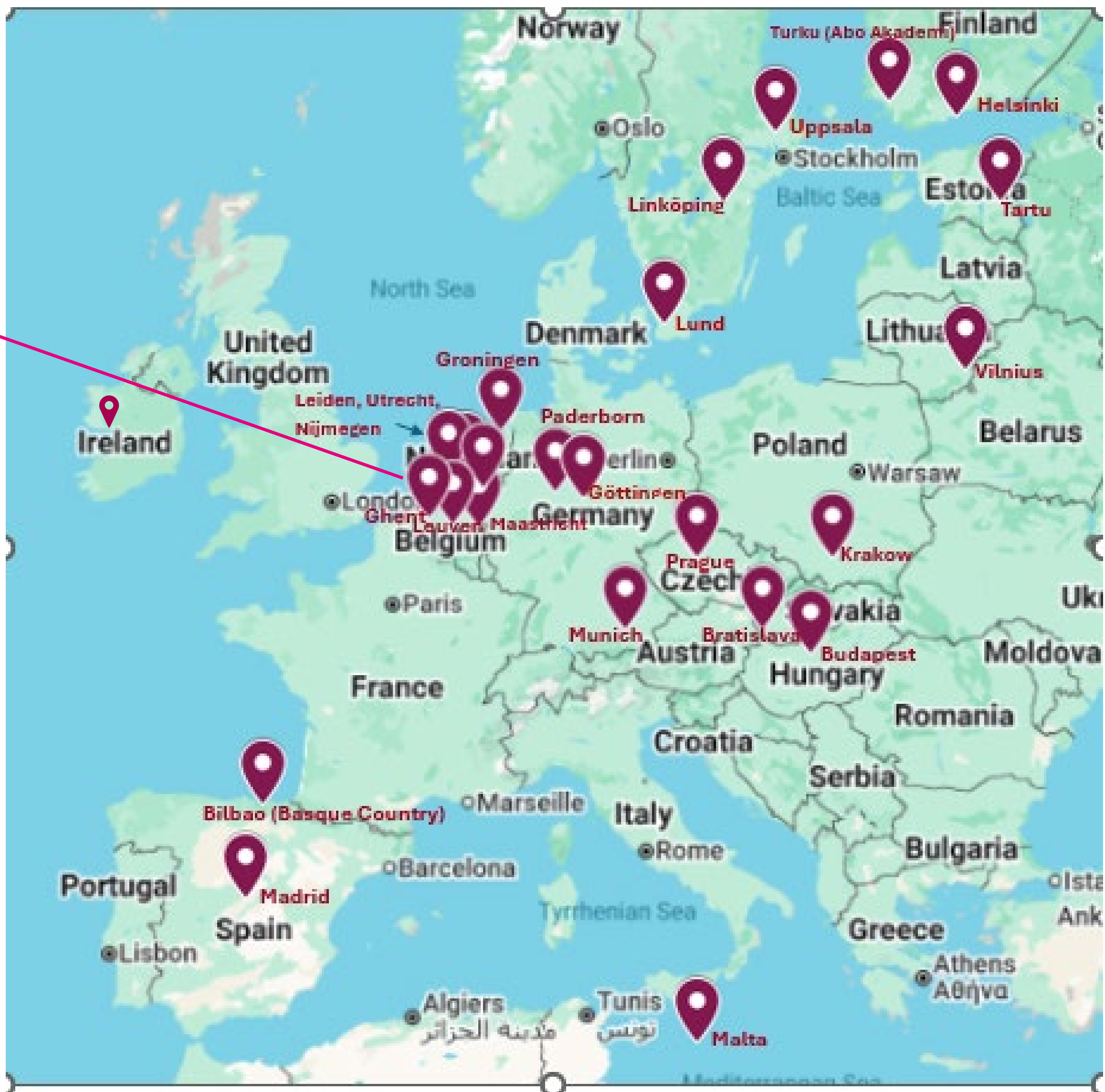
Academic coordinator: the lecturer at the University of Galway who will provide guidance on course choice and sign your learning agreement, and with whom you are expected to keep in touch before and during your year abroad.





HOW IT WORKS

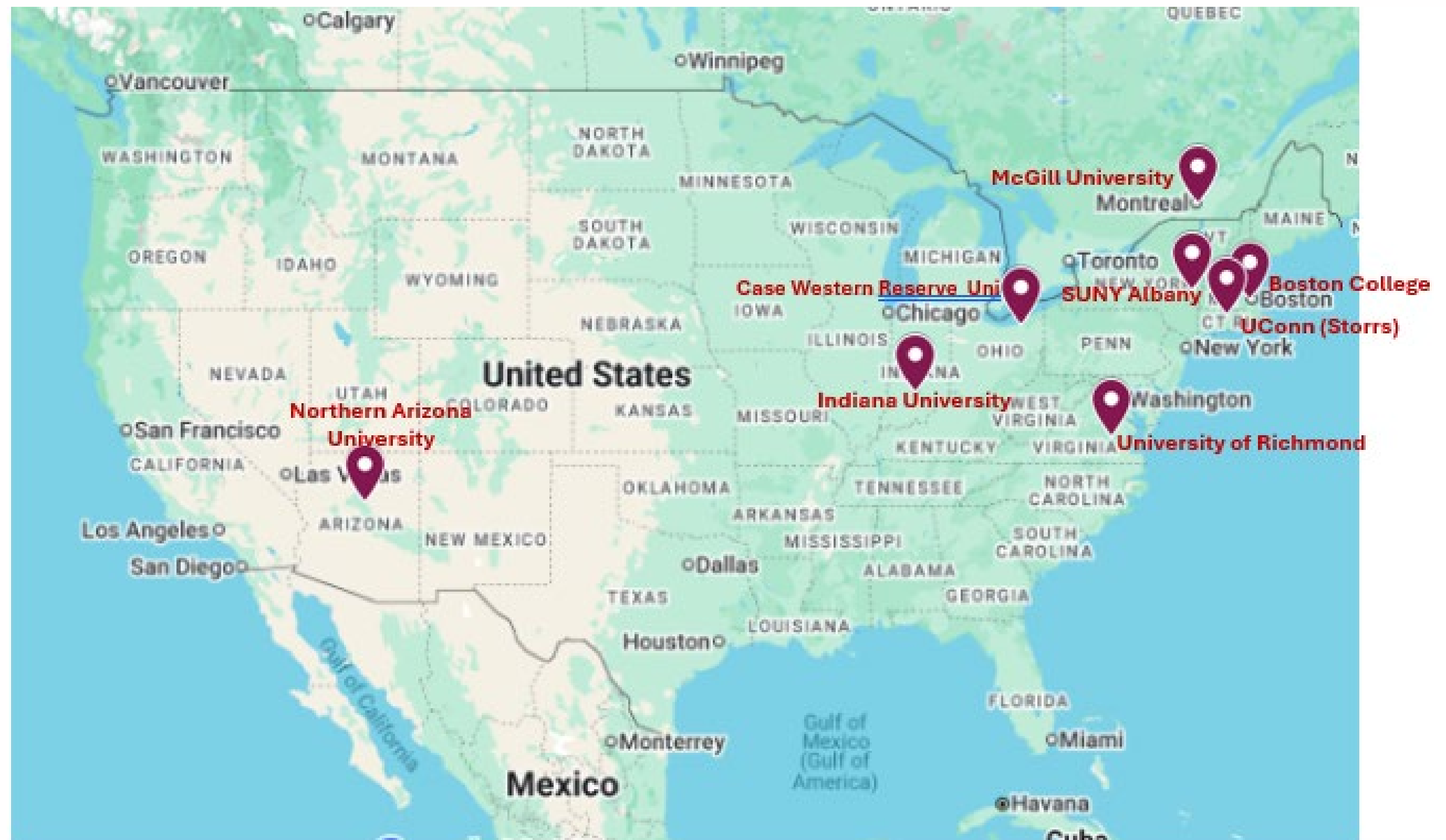
- Period of study is 1 academic year (not a semester)
- No tuition fees to Host University – but pay normal registration fee to the University of Galway.
- So you remain registered as a University of Galway student while studying abroad.
- The year abroad must be completed successfully: 40 ECTS in total
- Ideally you'll take both of your degree subjects, but you must take a total of 40 ECTS of modules related or complementary to *at least one* of your degree subjects.
- Pass all modules: receive 60 ECTS from University of Galway, i.e. a Pass in the Year Abroad

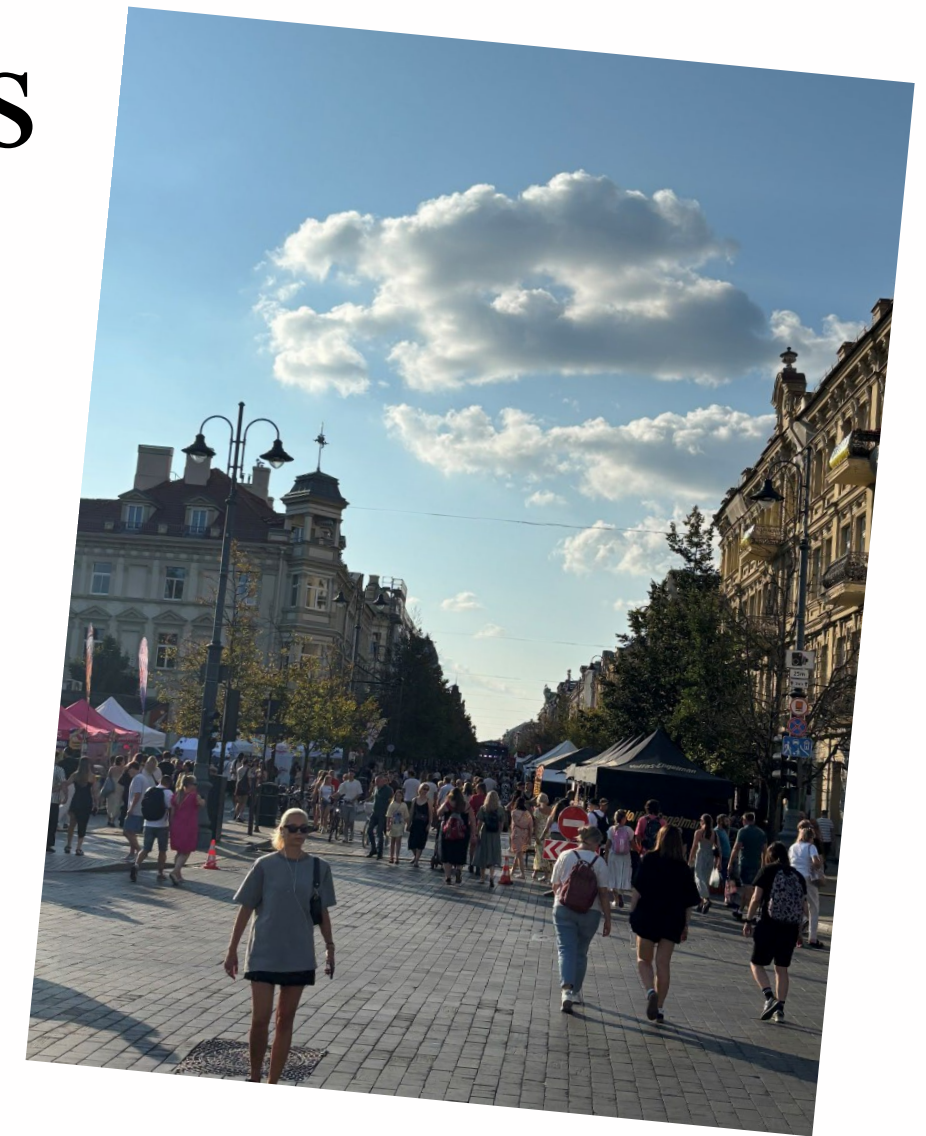


Cian, currently on Erasmus in Vilnius, Lithuania

I'm very much settled in here in Lithuania, and although it's getting cold, I'm having a great time! The city is amazing and I'm never short of things to do and places to see. Katie, currently studying at McGill University, Montreal, Canada

I am loving the experience. I have travelled a little, tried new foods and made loads of friends. The campus is beautiful, and my professors are lovely. Feeling really lucky to have had this opportunity.

One thing that has really stood out to me at McGill is the people. People I met from my accommodation on my second day in the country are now my close friends. Everyone is in the same boat trying to make friends so absolutely nobody has been stand-offish. For our reading week, my group of friends and I actually travelled to New York and Boston and had the best time together. Even the professors are very interactive. In my first class of the year, the professor knew every single student he spoke to by name and when I spoke to him after the class, he asked me mine and has made it a point to remember it. The same goes for the Canadian students who are here full-time. Everyone I have met in class and at parties have been so welcoming, offering suggestions of places to visit and eat and inviting my friends and I to parties. Although there are big differences to how we do university in Ireland, with everyone's help I have found it rather easy to adjust.

Jade, currently on Erasmus at KU Leuven, Belgium

I'm definitely enjoying Leuven - classes are very full on, but very interesting and we have lots of European guest lecturers who have great experience! It is very much opening my eyes to a broader European perspective on both Law and Economics. There is also a good few Irish students studying here from Galway, Limerick and Dublin, so that is definitely helping with my transition in Leuven.

- Lively student atmosphere, and Irish culture -
 - There is an Irish pub called Stapletons in the town, where I met most of my friends who are from Ireland
 - Oude Market which is a street of various pubs and restaurants which is always busy and is just outside the law campus
 - Irish GAA team which practices twice a week called the Earls of Leuven.
 - There is always student activities organised either by the University, societies or student accommodations - eg there was a 24 hour run on around Leuven, and all throughout the first week there was various international parties through the ESN
- The university is spread out around Leuven, so most people cycle everywhere, although you can get a bus pass for the year which is 30 euro. Everything is very accessible on foot however.
- The lectures are always very interesting and engaging - however they are 2 hours long, and there is an expectation that you already have prior knowledge on the topic from your undergraduate degree
 - All of the modules are very European focused - a lot of discussion on the EU
 - There is often guest lecturers who have very interesting background and experience in what they are lecturing in - for example we had a guest lecturer from NATO in last week
- There is a train station in Leuven which is 15 minutes trip to the airport, and connects to all the major cities in Belgium, so it is easy to travel around Belgium, and to surrounding countries

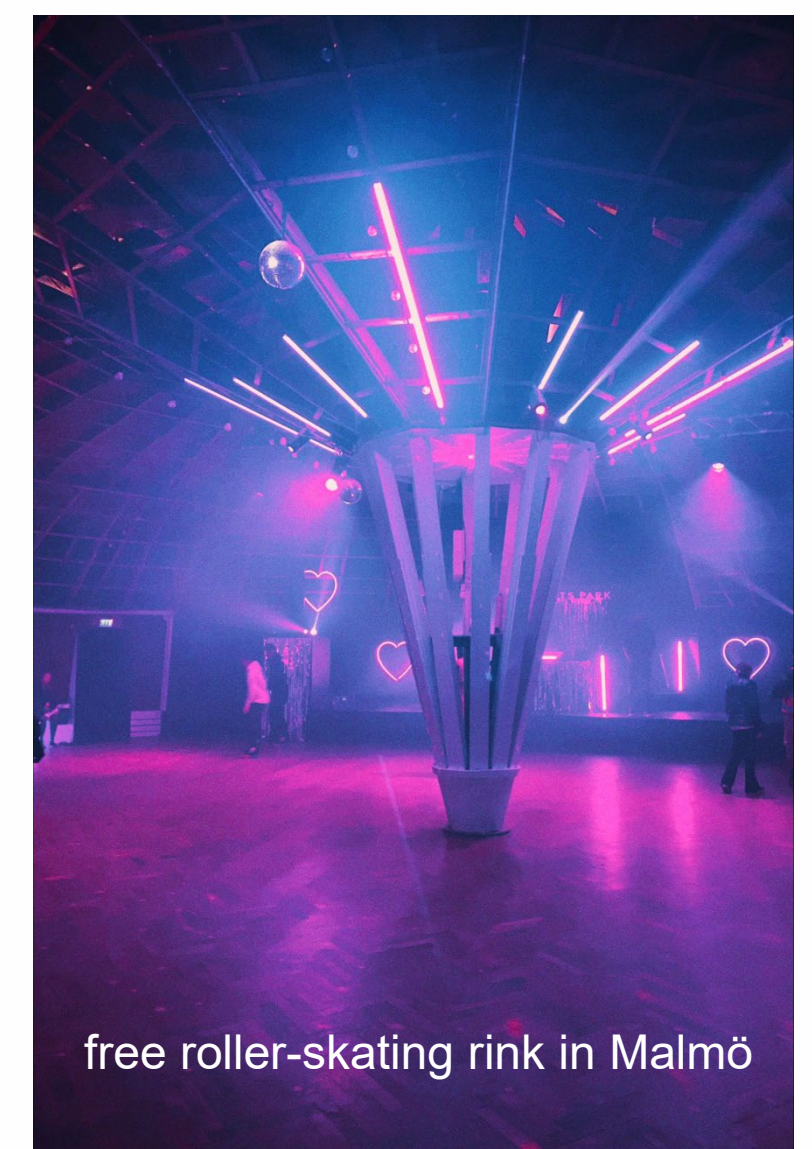

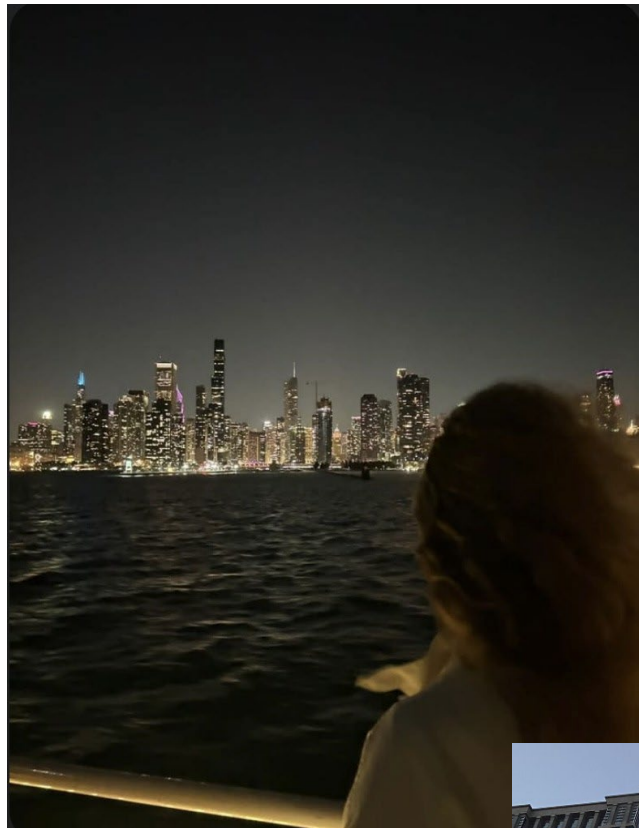
Life in Sweden has just been so wonderful, and I cannot recommend Lund enough!!

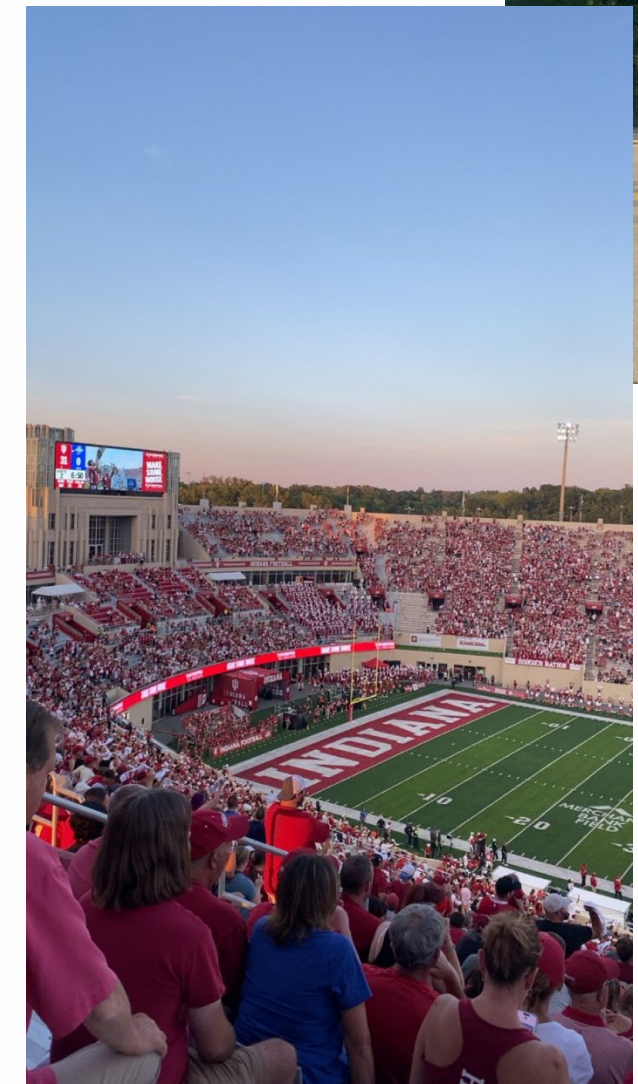


AnneSophie, studying at Indiana University

Sophie, currently on Erasmus in Groningen, the Netherlands

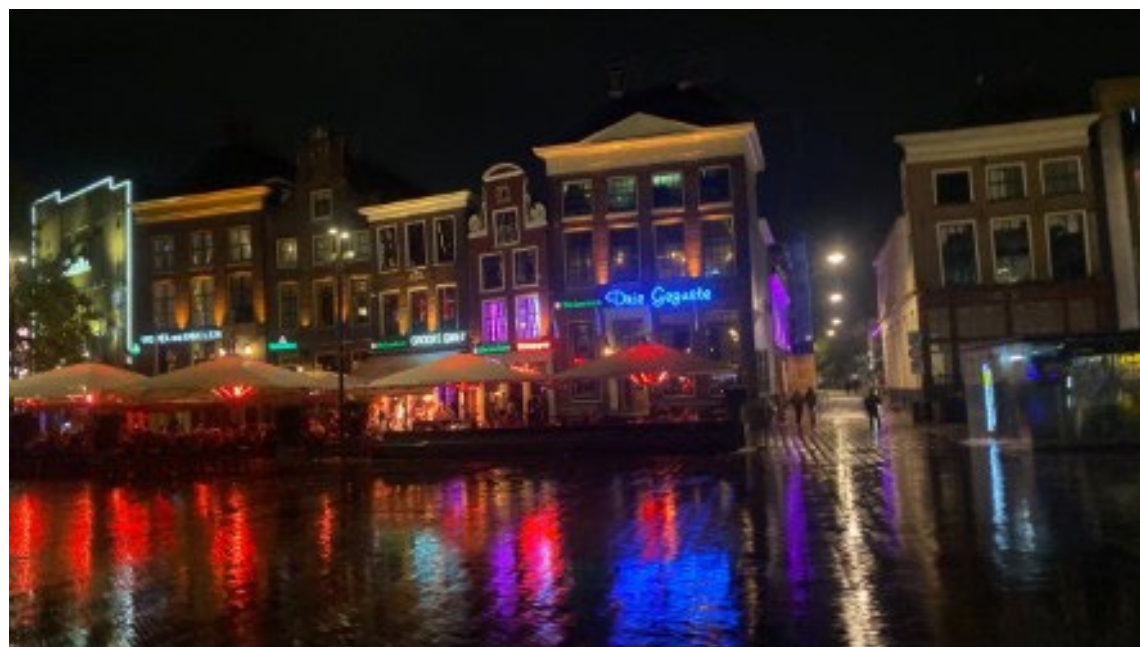
I am studying in Groningen in the Netherlands. It has been very exciting experience so far.

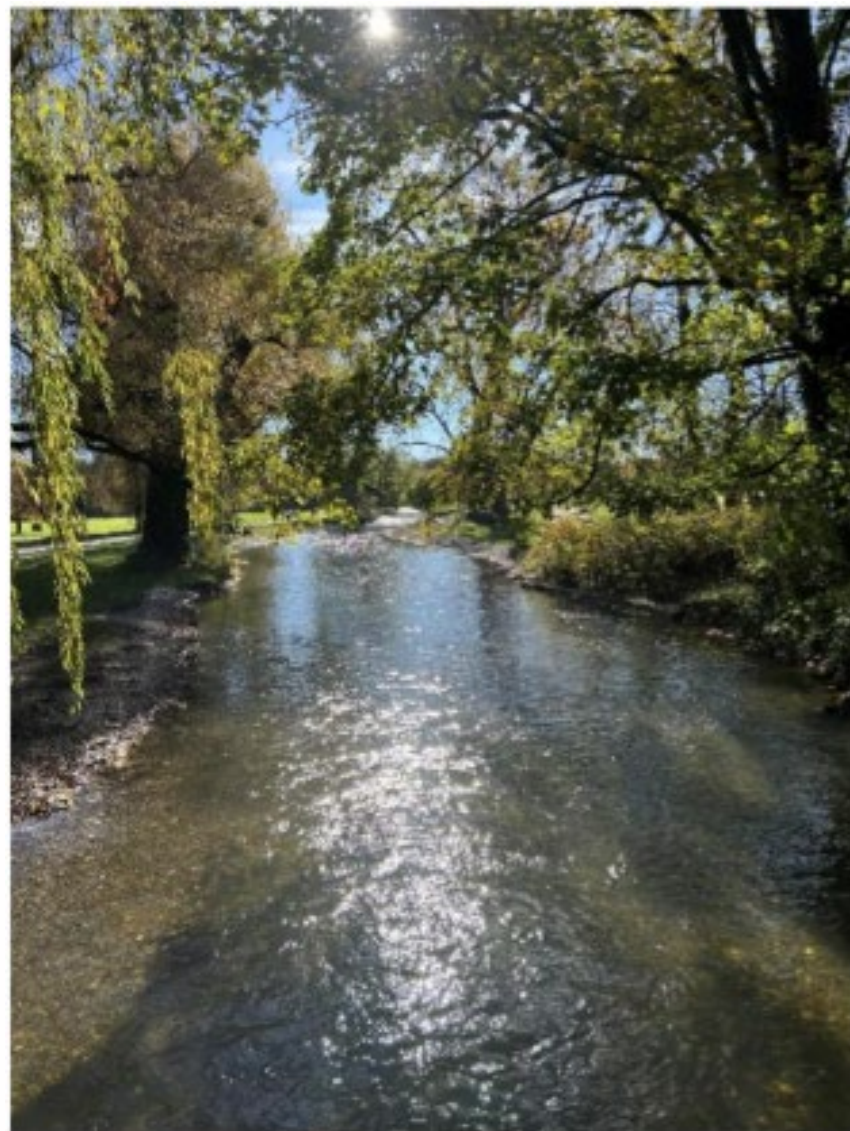
The city is full of young people from Dutch to international students.

Munich is a big, beautiful city full of history but also full of life, there is always events, something to do or somewhere to go.

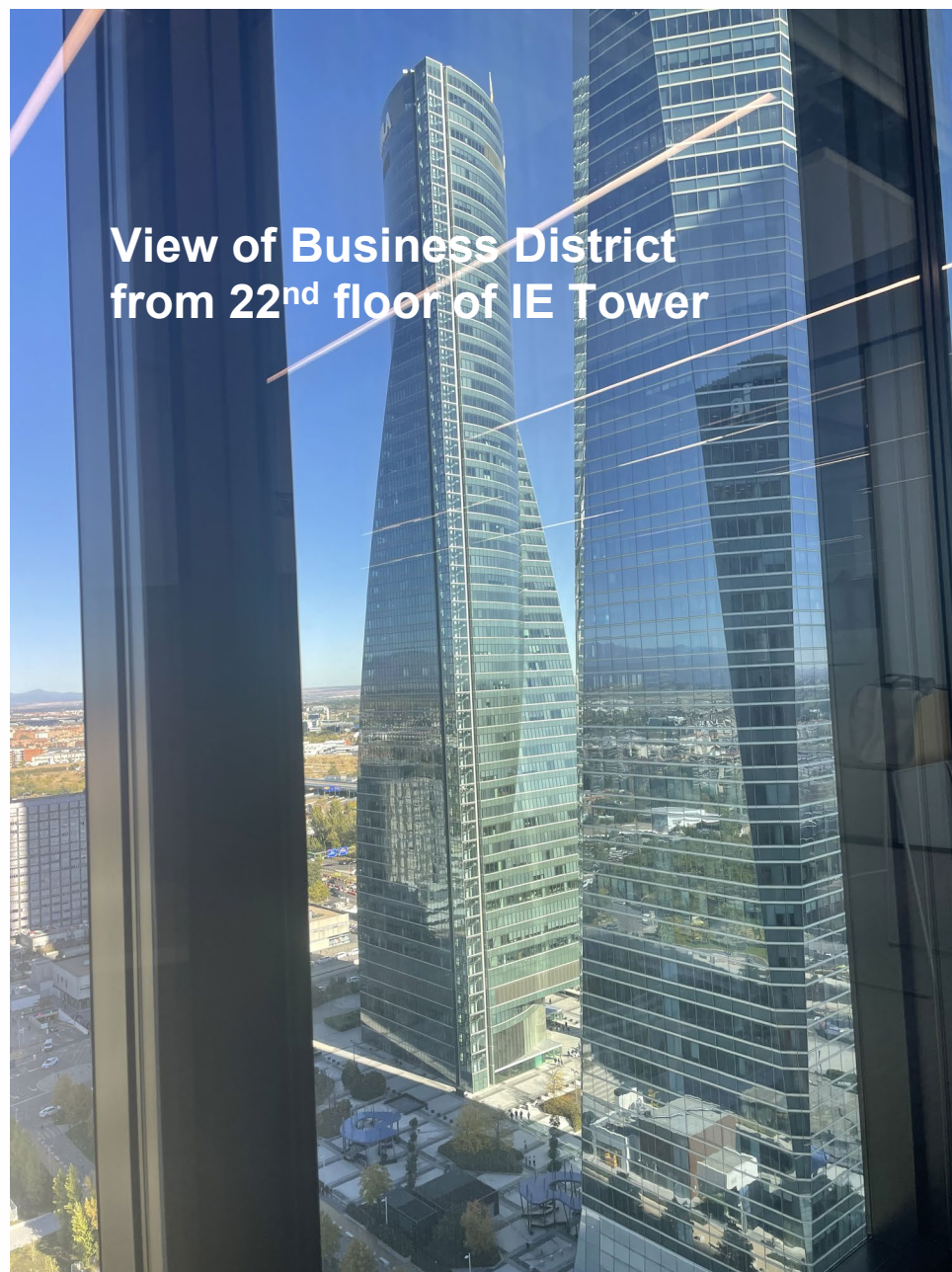

Overall, I'm really enjoying my time here, I love the German culture and living in Munich and also having the opportunity to improve my German.

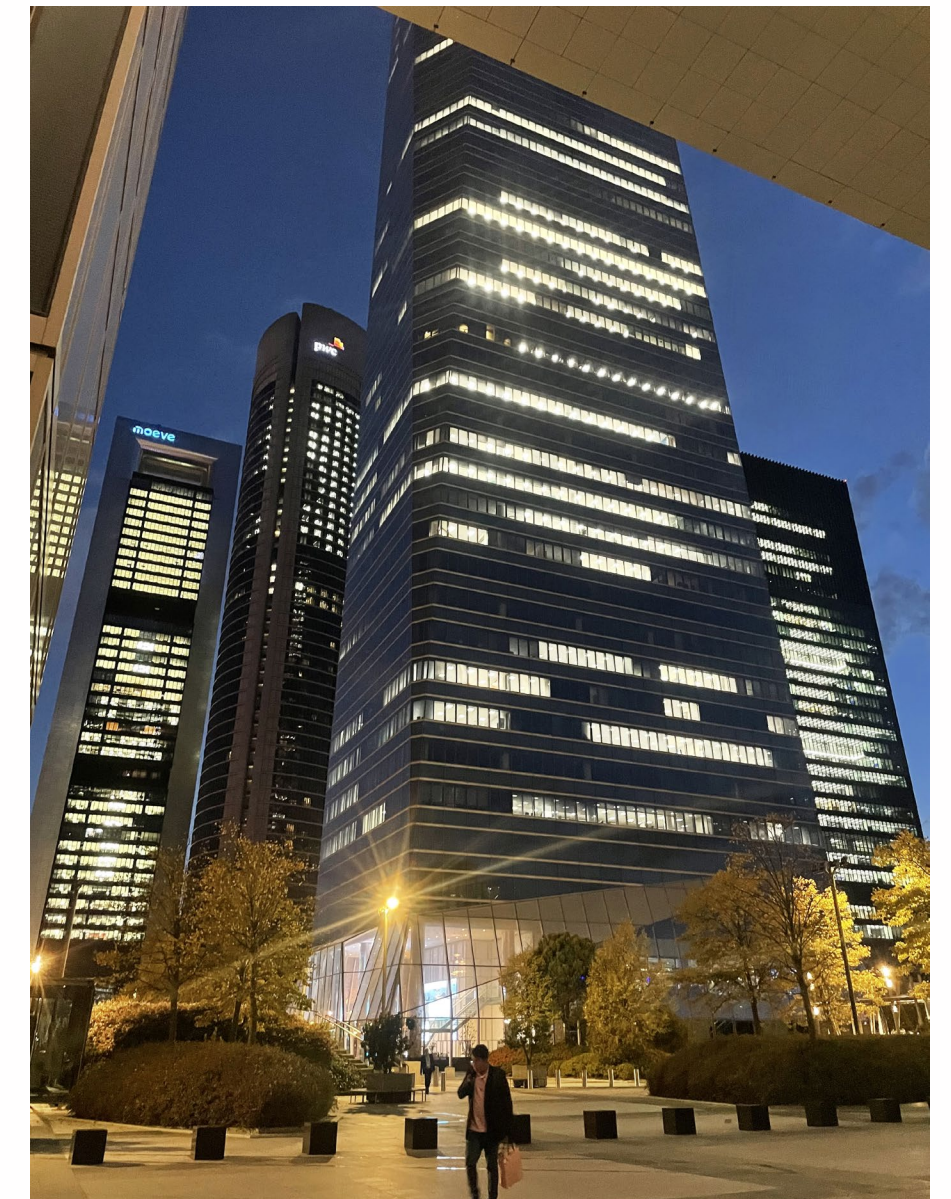


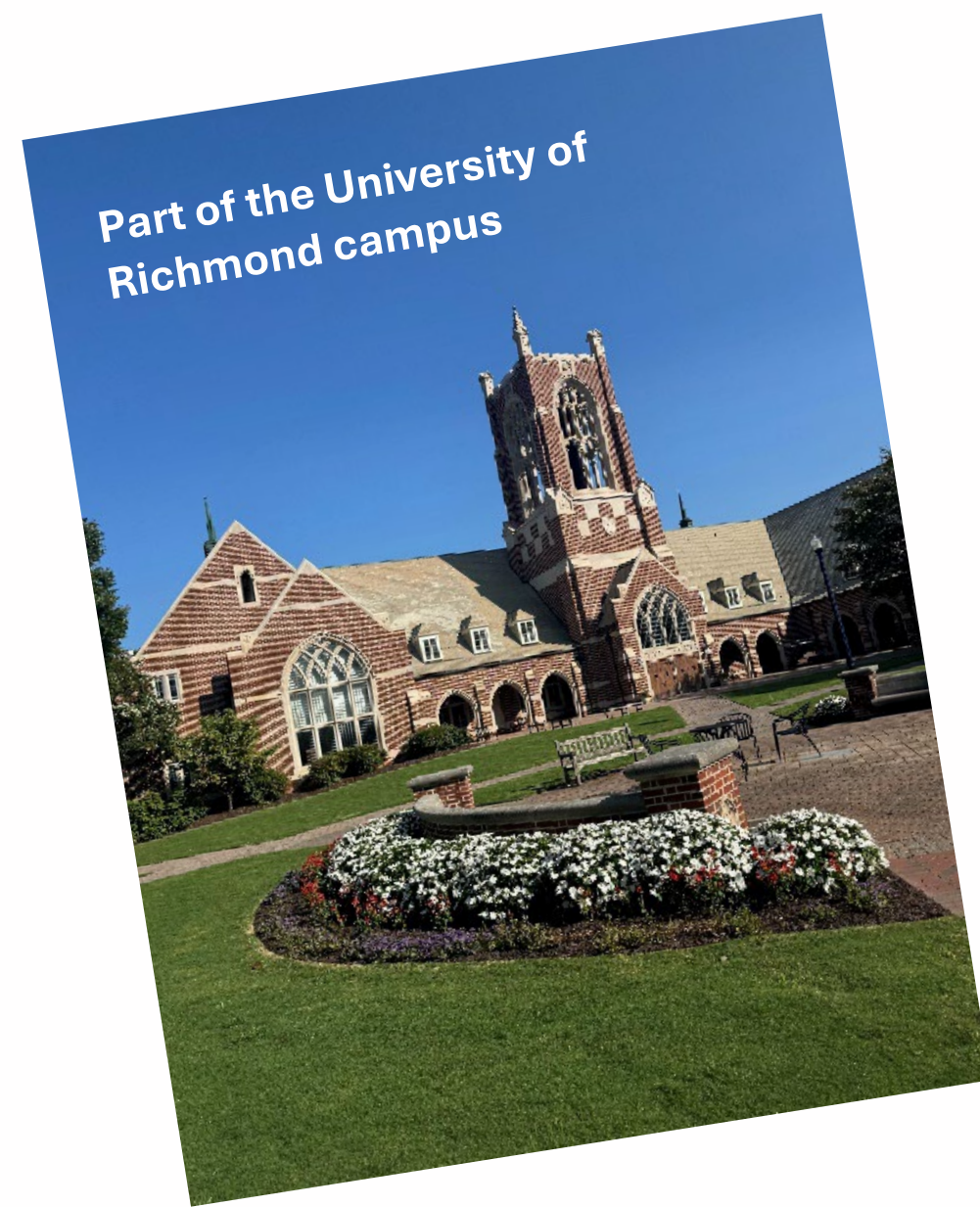


Julie, currently on Erasmus at IE Madrid

IE University is modern , with classes held in the 30-floor tower in the business district of Madrid, which serves as the campus. Very different to Galway in that sense but very cool. As an exchange student it has been fairly easy to integrate with the students here as the student body is so international already . The classes are small usually and contain a lot of debates and presentations. I found the professors really good and engaging and the module choice is very wide and unique (they have modules that use VR and media labs etc). The city itself I could not recommend more as there is so much to offer with great nightlife, parks , markets, food, shopping, cultural events and festivals, and very good day trips from there too. Clubs and socs at the university are not as big as in Galway I've found, but there are so many running clubs and sports clubs for exchange students organised by the ESN and other organisations. There is a very good network for exchange students in the city. The metro is great and links all areas to each other and is cheap, 10 euro a month for youth card.

And of course Madrid is a beautiful European city with amazing architecture, museums and weather! Flights from Madrid are cheap and short so also easy to visit other Spanish and European cities.

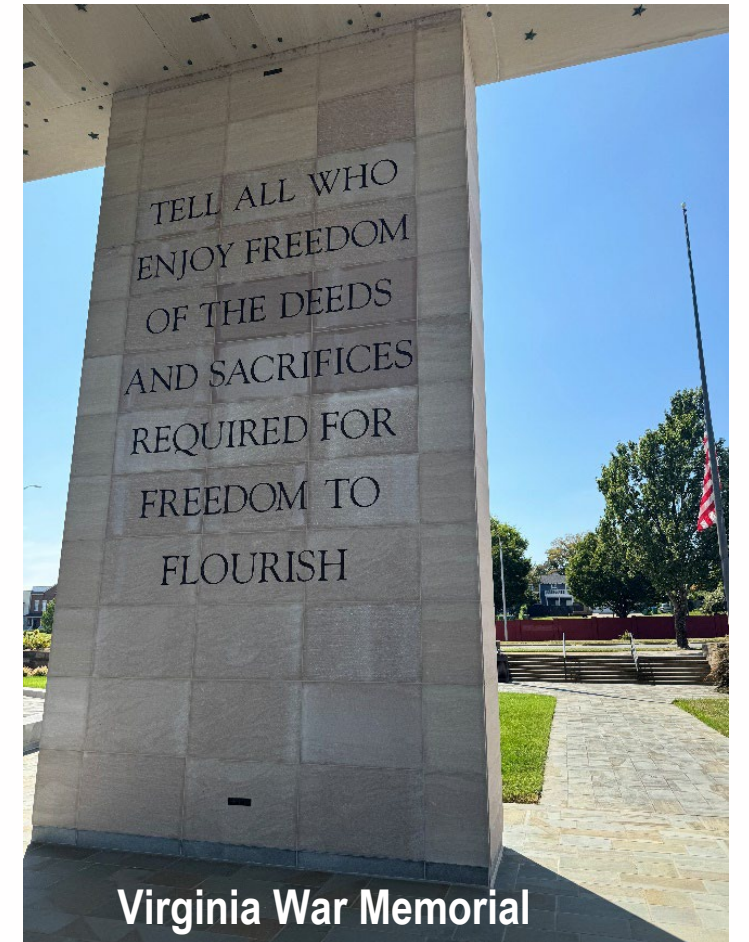

Social Sciences is one of the few areas where they offer extensive teaching through English.

German is not necessary, but would be useful, and language classes are available.



Will the University of Galway arrange my accommodation abroad?

- No, but ...
- We will offer advice on this topic
- Each host university has a dedicated **Accommodation Service**.
- Possibility of a room in a student residence
- Early application advisable!



How should I choose courses?

- Consult the host university's online course catalogue
- Avoid duplicating what you've already studied.
- Avoid significant overlap with your Final Year courses.
- Modules to complement and enhance your study of your degree subjects.
- Modules that you wouldn't ordinarily get the chance to study.
- Modules related to society/culture of host country.
- Avoid self-study modules.
- Need approval from University of Galway academic coordinators.



Will the marks I get while abroad count towards my degree?

- Period abroad assessed on **Pass/Fail** basis by University of Galway
- Transcript from host university will show all your results
- Valuable document, e.g. for postgrad applications, seeking employment, etc



What if I fail the Year Abroad?

- Upon return to University of Galway, you can be transferred to 3BA1
- Fees: ~€2,000*
- Lose SUSI funding*
- Erasmus grant may have to be repaid

**GY129 is a 4-year programme. If you fail Year 3 and have to join Third Year of GY101, you are now on a 3-year programme, but have already used up 3 years' worth of government-funded tuition fees, so are liable for Repeat Fees.*



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COSTS— What to budget for

- Flights, including flight home at Christmas
- Accommodation
- Household bills
- Food
- Books, materials
- Leisure
- Insurance (for North America)

ESTIMATES – some examples

Uppsala University: ~ €920 per month

University of Tartu: €400 to €600 per month

Boston College: \$25,000 for the academic year (~ €22K)

Start saving early!

ESTIMATES – some more examples
Helsinki: ~ €900 - €1250 per month
Leiden, Leuven: €950 to €1300 per month
Malta: €400 - €700
Ghent: €1300 per month





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FUNDING

- Erasmus funding for study in Europe:
 - €385 per month for many countries
 - €330 per month for Czechia, Estonia, Hungary, Lithuania, Malta, Poland, Slovakia, Spain
 - 80% of total grant at start, balance on return
 - Plus one-off travel grant, based on distance
 - Supplementary Erasmus funding for financially disadvantaged students
 - Maintain eligibility for SUSI grant, etc
 - “non-adjacent” rate may apply, provided study abroad integral to course
 - (Erasmus Disability grant, if applicable)
 - Erasmus funding cannot be guaranteed!*
- Boston College: \$5,000 scholarship
- Other non-EU: no funding

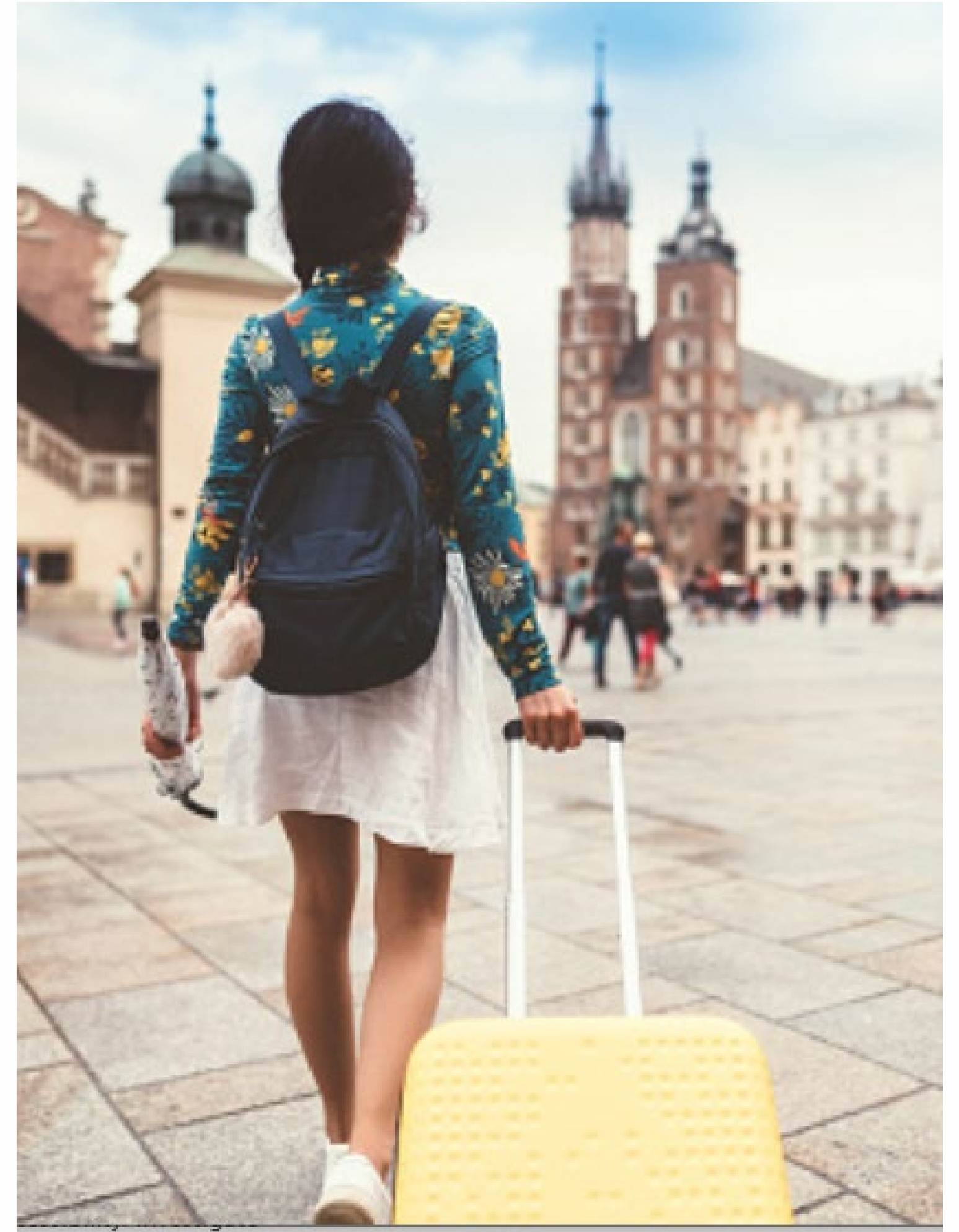

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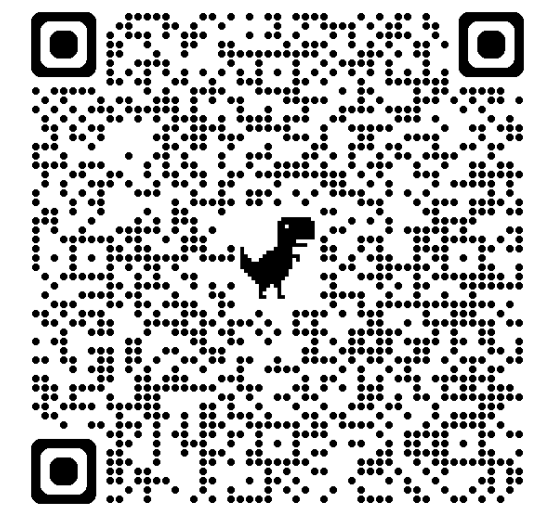
Be aware that ...
